Dual Enrollment Overview

Dual enrollment is a program that allows eligible secondary students (grades 6 through 12) to take postsecondary coursework and simultaneously earn credit toward a high school diploma and an associate or baccalaureate degree.

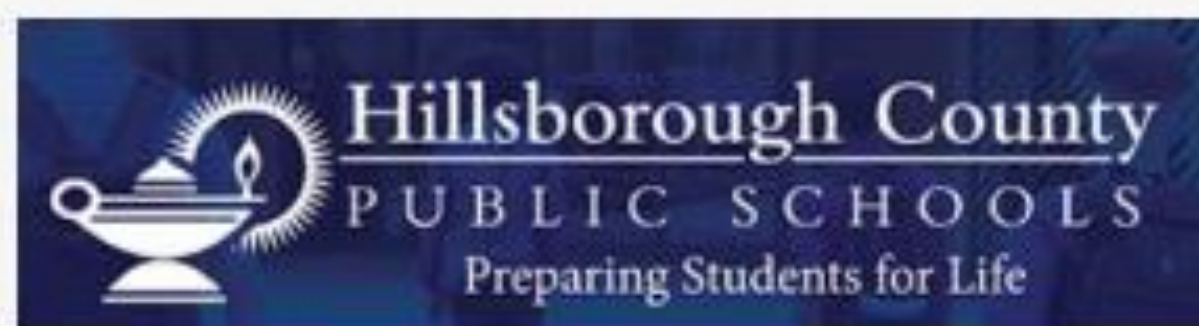
- Dual enrollment course offerings, both on and off the high school campus, provide greater academic options and considerable financial savings for our families.
- Dual Enrollment courses are predominantly taken at HCC. Qualified students may be approved to take DE courses at USF and eligible juniors and seniors may also be approved to take courses online through UF.

- ✓ Open to high school juniors and seniors
- ✓ Minimum 3.6 State (unweighted) high school GPA
- ✓ Minimum scores on one of the following tests:
 - SAT 1100 composite
 - PSAT/NMSQT 1130 composite
 - ACT 22 composite
 - CLT 72

Early Admission Overview

- Early admission is a form of dual enrollment through which eligible secondary students enroll in a postsecondary institution (HCC or USF) on a full-time basis in courses that are creditable toward the high school diploma and the associate or baccalaureate degree.
- Students must begin Early Admission in the first semester of their final year of high school and may not take any additional courses at their high school or on HVK12/FLVS.
- Early Admission students must register for a minimum of 12 credit hours per term and a maximum of 15 credit hours per term.
- Early admission students can only take courses at the institution at which they are enrolled.

Eligibility Requirements for Early Admission at HCC

- Entering last year of high school
- Have an unweighted 3.5 high school GPA at the end of 11th grade
- Not in the running for a distinction (Valedictorian or Salutatorian)
- Have completed all requirements for high school graduation or have one or more of the following courses remaining:
 - 1 credit of English **and/or**
 - 1 credit of Math **and/or**
 - 0.5 credit of Economics **and/or**
 - 0.5 credit of American Government
- Score at college level on SAT, PSAT/NMSQT, ACT and/or PERT

Early Admission at USF

- Entering last year of high school
- Unweighted 3.8 high school State GPA
- 2 years of a foreign language
- Have completed all requirements for high school graduation or have one or more of the following courses remaining:
 - 1 credit of English **and/or**
 - 1 credit of Math **and/or**
 - 0.5 credit of Economics **and/or**
 - 0.5 credit of American Government
- Test Scores: SAT: 1300, with at least 580 in Critical Reading; ACT: 29, with at least 29 in English; CLT: 38 Verbal (V+W), 16 Quantitative (Q)

AP, or Advanced Placement, are courses developed and offered by the CollegeBoard. They are college courses offered in a high school that are rigorous and challenging. They earn the college credit upon successfully completing and scoring at least a 3 on the exam.

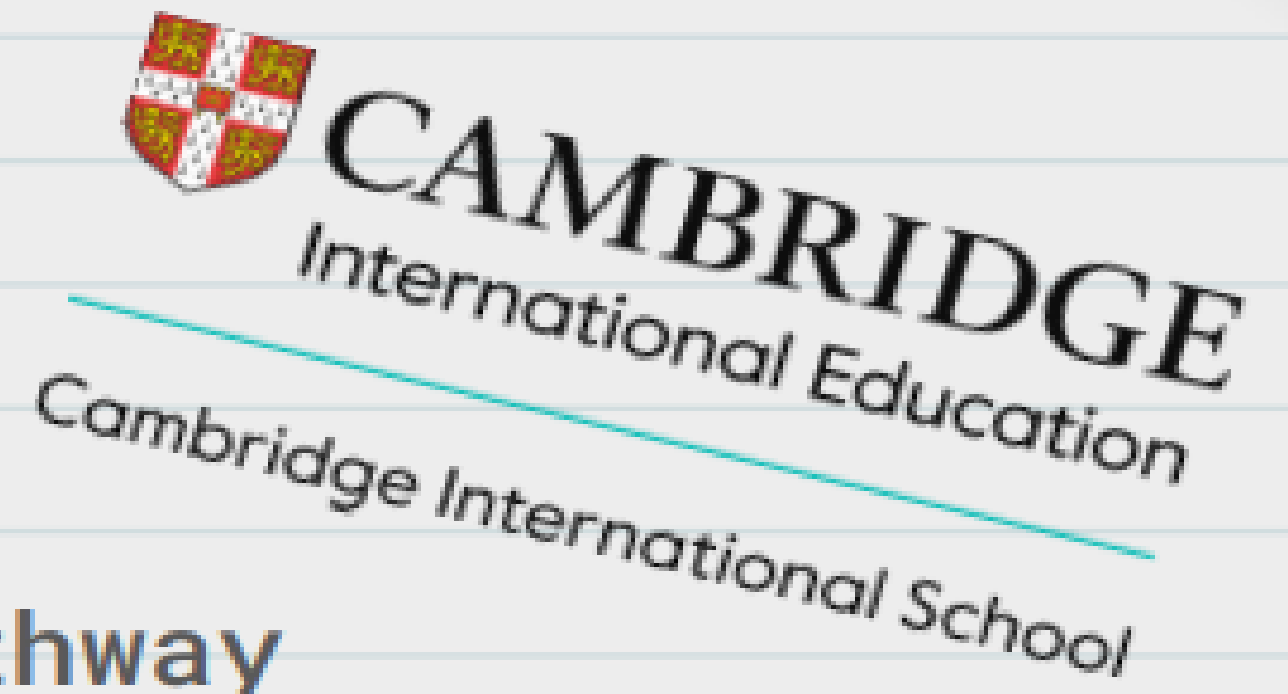


Your school achieved all criteria to be listed on this year's AP School Honor Roll as a Silver school!

For planning and goal-setting, the three criteria for **GOLD** schools are:

- Expand your school's college culture by enabling 65% of your Class of 2025 to experience 1 AP course before graduating.
- Assist with college affordability by enabling 35% of your Class of 2025 to earn college credit by earning an AP Exam score of 3.
- Optimize student's college readiness by creating opportunities for 10% of your Class of 2025 to take a total of 5 APs across their high school years, with at least 1 taken in 9th or 10th grade.

AICE



What is AICE:

- A part of the Cambridge Pathway
- The Advanced International Certificate of Education (AICE)
- International diploma that students can earn via an advanced academic curriculum and assessment program written and administered by a non-profit department (CIE) of the University of Cambridge in England.

Cambridge AICE Overview

The AICE program is a part of the Cambridge Pathway that includes acceleration course options throughout high school. These courses are comprised of an AICE examination that can culminate into an AICE student earning an AICE Diploma after successful completion of 7 examinations with scores a-e.

The State provides the following benefits to schools and students engaged in the AICE program:

- A passing course examination score:
 - Qualifies a student for college credit (depending on State Course Equivalency)
 - Counts towards a student's 7 examinations for the AICE Diploma option
- A grade earned in AICE or pre-AICE is assigned additional weight for GPA purposes.

AICE Diploma completers are eligible for Bright Futures- regardless of SAT or ACT Scores. They will be required to meet 100 volunteer or work hours.

BRIGHT FUTURES

Bright Futures - Florida Academic Scholars = pays \$213.55 per credit hour for up to 5 years from graduation for a maximum of 120 hours

Traditional Qualifications:

- High school diploma
- Be a Florida resident and US citizen or eligible non-citizen
- Achieve minimum weighted HS GPA (3.5 for full scholarship, 3.0 for partial)
- Meet required test scores on SAT, ACT or CLT (1330/29/95 for full, 1190/24/82 for partial)
- Complete 100 work or community service hours (can be combined)
- Complete the Florida Financial Aid Application

Alternative Qualifications: National Merit Finalist/Scholars, National Hispanic Recognition Program, AICE Diploma, IB Diploma

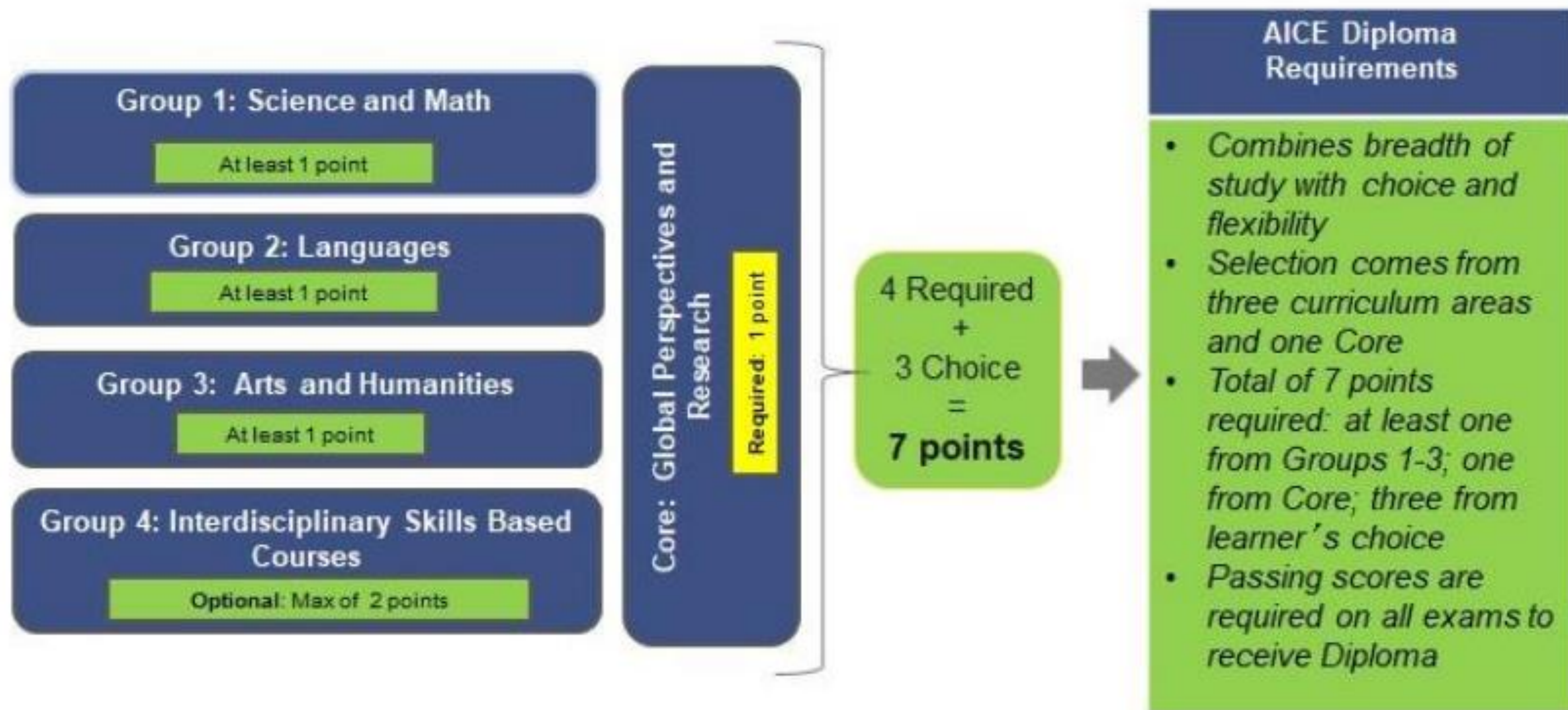
AICE diploma does not require students to earn the test scores but does require the other qualifications



AICE DIPLOMA

If a student earns an AICE diploma, completes 100 hours of community service/work, has the qualifying GPA, and fills out the Florida Financial Aid Application, the student will automatically earn the Academic Scholars Award. The student will not have to earn the benchmark score on the ACT or SAT to qualify for Bright Futures.

- Each subject receives a separate grade.
 - Grades are from A* to E, with A* being the highest.
- Exams in "November" and "June"
 - Test Dates will be released towards the end of October There are NO make-up dates.
 - **If a student is not present for the exam day, they will not be able to make-up the test and will have to pay for the re-test.**

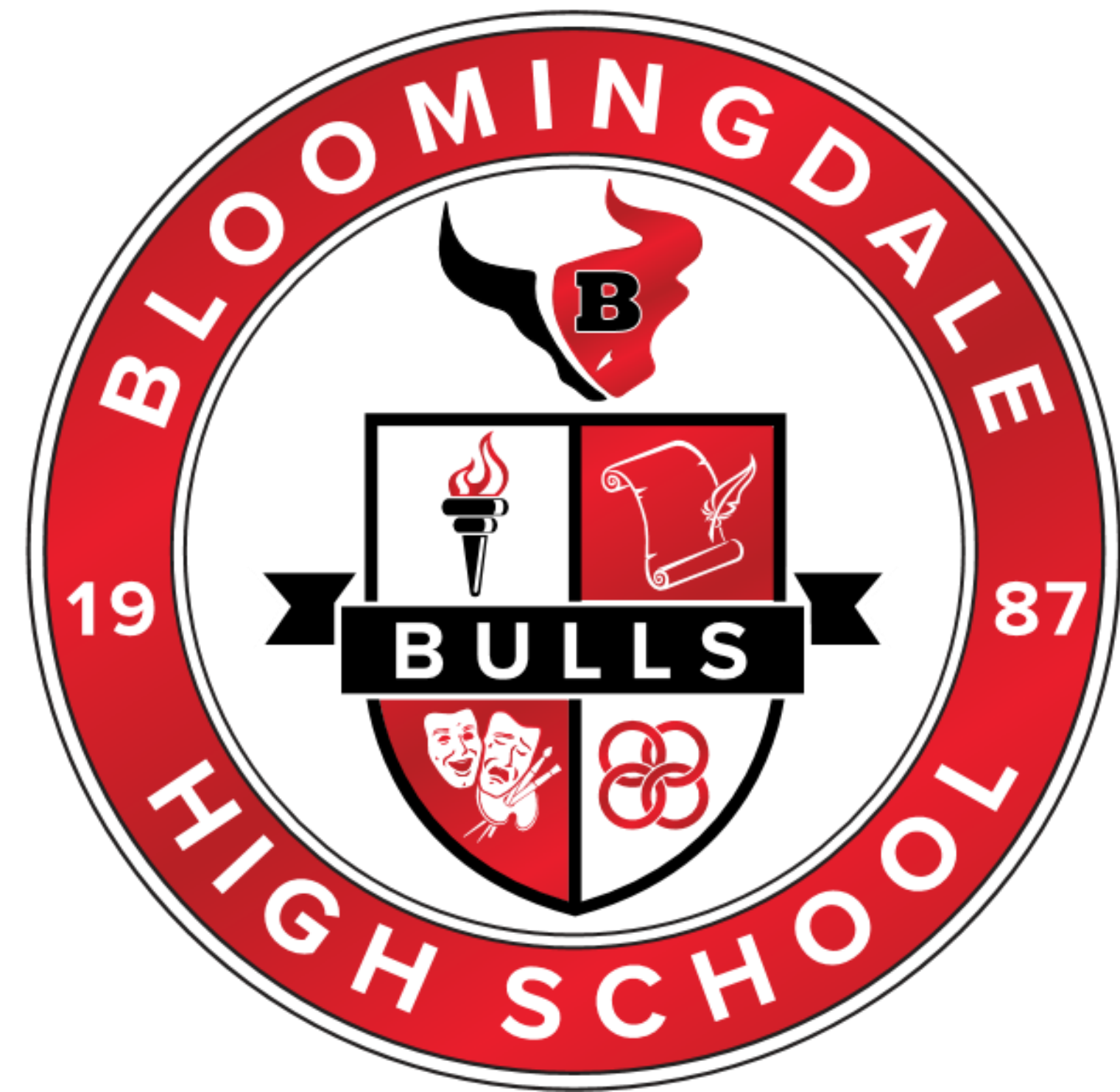
