Acceleration Opportunities

- Advanced Placement
 - College-level course taken at Bloomingdale
 - Pass an exam at the end of the year to earn college credit
- AICE
 - College-level courses taken at Bloomingdale
 - Pass an exam at the end of the year to earn college credit
 - Pass 7 AICE courses and exams in three years to earn the AICE Diploma = 100% Bright Futures
- Dual Enrollment
 - HCC courses taken at Bloomingdale, at HCC, or online
 - Earn college credit by passing the class
 - Grades will impact your college GPA

Advanced Placement (AP) Student Agreement:

All students that want to enroll in an AP course MUST read, initial and sign below.

____1. I will be expected to complete summer reading assignments/projects and failure to do so will not result in a schedule change.

____2. The course(s) will be challenging, and I will be expected to produce work that is held to a higher academic standard; it is incumbent upon me to work harder to raise a low grade.

____3. A schedule change will not be granted because of teacher preference, low grades, difficult or over-scheduled, or because the class is too demanding.

____4. If I drop an AP course after the November exam ordering deadline, I will still be responsible for the \$40 exam fee.

____5. I am expected to take the AP exam in May and understand I will be charged for the exam if I do not have a College Board approved reason for missing it.

Graduation Requirements

- **English** 4 required: English I, II, III, IV
- **Mathematics** 4 required: Including Algebra I or equivalent & Geometry.
- **Science** 3 required: Including Biology (2 must have lab component)
- **Social Studies** 3 required: Including 1 World History, 1 U.S. History, 0.5 U.S. Government & 0.5 Economics
- **Fine Arts** 1 required: In Fine or Performing Arts, or an approved Practical Arts course (2 years of ROTC waives Fine Art requirement)
- **Physical Ed (HOPE)** 1 required: Physical Education to include the integration of Health (2 years of ROTC waives HOPE)
- **World Language** Not required for graduation, but at least 2 credits in the same language are required for admission into four-year colleges and universities.
- **Electives** 8 required.
- **GPA** 2.0 state GPA (unweighted)
- **Minimum Credits** 24
- **Assessment** Passing Score on Grade 10 FAST (or concordant ACT or SAT score), Algebra 1 EOC (or concordant ACT, SAT, or PSAT score)

Dual Enrollment Courses

Dual Enrollment students take HCC courses without paying for tuition or textbooks. They receive college credit for their courses and begin their college transcripts with course grades.

Dual Enrollment Course Requirements

- Applications must be completed and approved for each semester by a School Counselor.
- All courses require a 3.0 unweighted state [GPA](#) and most courses require a College Ready Score on PERT/SAT/ACT.

For courses taken at HCC, students are responsible for completing all required HCC paperwork for each semester by the deadlines posted on HCC's website. Courses selected cannot conflict with student's established schedule.

Hillsborough County Schedule Change Policy

- **Valid reasons for a schedule change** may [include](#): counselor or computer error, failing a required course, passing a course in summer or night school, lacking a grad requirement, and lacking proper prerequisite.
- **Elective changes cannot be honored** due to teacher unit allocation.
- Schedule change requests will **not be considered** for the purpose of teacher preference.
- A change request may require the entire schedule to be altered, including teachers and periods.
- Once a schedule has been changed, it cannot be changed back to the original schedule.
- Failure to complete summer reading does not constitute a valid reason for a schedule change.

Testing Requirements – FAST Reading

- Passing score on the 10th grade FAST ELA is required for graduation
- Your score on the FAST ELA will impact your schedule for next year
 - If you don't pass the FAST ELA this year, you will have a reading class on your schedule next year for the full year
 - Reading class takes the place of one of your electives

SAT/ACT Concordant Scores

- Juniors and Seniors who have not passed the FAST can use the SAT or ACT to meet the reading requirement
 - SAT – 480 EBRW
 - ACT – Average of an 18 on English and Reading
 - CLT – 36 Verbal Reasoning and Grammar/Writing sections sum

Testing Requirements – Algebra 1 EOC

- Passing score on the Algebra 1 EOC is required for graduation
- Your score on the Algebra 1 EOC will impact the math class on your schedule next year

Algebra 1 EOC Comparative Score

- Students who have taken but not passed the Algebra 1 EOC can earn a Comparative Score to meet the math testing requirement
 - PSAT – 430 Math
 - SAT – 420 Math
 - ACT – 16 Math
 - CLT – 11 Quantitative Reasoning
 - Geometry EOC – Level 3

Programming Timeline

- Complete programming sheets in January
- Counselors will enter course requests
- You'll have the opportunity to meet with your counselor in February to review your course requests and make any changes
- Schedules will be set in the summer, and you'll see your schedule at open house

Dual Enrollment Courses

- The following dual enrollment courses are offered after school
 - Early American History (semester 1)
 - Modern American History (semester 2)
- The following dual enrollment courses are offered during the school day
 - First Year Experience – Test scores not required
- You must have a minimum unweighted State GPA of at least 3.0 and college ready test scores to take dual enrollment classes

Dual Enrollment Deadlines

- Summer 2025
 - Paperwork due: 4/4
 - Registration deadline: 4/25
- Fall 2025
 - Paperwork due: 5/23
 - Registration deadline: TBD (Usually mid-June)
- You must submit registration paperwork (Form B) by the paperwork deadline each semester to register for off-campus dual enrollment classes.

Leaving Early – 11th and 12th

- Fill out the programming sheet as though you were going to take a full schedule on campus
- You must take at least 4 classes on campus in periods 1-4, and you must be enrolled in 7 total classes both semesters
- Second semester, sign up for your FLVS or dual enrollment courses for the fall
- Let your counselor know what you want to take on campus, and we'll update your course requests
- If you're going to take FLVS classes, you should register for those classes before the end of this school year.
- Dual enrollment paperwork for fall classes is due in May.
